PROGRAM NOTES

TONIGHT'S PROGRAM WILL PRESENT THE ENTIRE ALL WITHOUT WORDS CONCERTO BEGINNING WITH LOREN'S THEME AND PROCEEDING WITH THE ELEVEN VARIATIONS. BELOW IS A DESCRIPTION OF JUSTIN MORRELL'S INSPIRATION FOR EACH OF THE MOVEMENTS.

"LOREN'S THEME"

The theme on which eleven variations are based is built around the spontaneous vocalizations of composer Justin Morell's nonverbal son, Loren. One evening, as the composer sat with his son and listened to the singing and sounds that his son often makes, he found a melody, He quickly returned to his workstation and transcribed the sounds into two different segments. The theme as arranged in this piece features these two phrases slowed down.

VARIATION ONE: "SEARCHING BUT NEVER FINDING"

Variation one explores the overwhelming emotions of being a new parent, finding out that your child has been diagnosed with autism, and the endless search for resources to help your child. One of the first things parents do when they're given the news is start looking for answers, wondering, where do we go from here? How do we help our child? This movement is all about those feelings of wanting to be there for your child.

VARIATION TWO: "TWO STEPS FORWARD"

This variation tells the story of the early days of the Morell family as they worked to develop language with Loren, but for every few steps of progress they'd make, they'd also take one step back. Variation two captures that constant cycle.

VARIATION THREE: "SEEING IT AGAIN FOR THE FIRST TIME"

Variation three is about understanding the situation of the day-to-day changes of raising an autistic child and approaching each day with fresh eyes. No two days are going to be the same and that is something a parent must accept.

VARIATION FOUR: "THE URGENCY OF EVERY MOMENT"

When a parent receives a diagnosis of autism in the first couple years of a child's life, there's a lot of pressure to do all of the right things as soon as possible to help with development before the window of opportunity closes. This is the most frantic and frenetic of the variations because it captures the sense of urgency and pressure felt as a parent of a child with special needs to address their needs as soon as possible.



PROGRAM NOTES

VARIATION FIVE: "INVISIBLE THINGS"

"Invisible Things" is about Justin Morell's admiration of his son's unique way of looking at the world. Loren has an acute awareness of the world around him like the shading of a leaf on the ground. He can listen to three or four different sources of music simultaneously, and if one of them stops playing, he's instantly aware of it. He sees things that, to us, are entirely invisible, and this song captures Justin's wonder of how Loren sees the world.

VARIATION SIX: "WALKING IN OUR OWN FOOTSTEPS: THE CIRCLE GAME"

The sixth variation is all about the way that Loren learns about the world. With his learning challenges, to accomplish something, it must be repeated over and over until it becomes a habit. Following the same techniques each day, it feels a lot like you're moving in a circle. In this particular movement, the beginning builds up a continual repeating note that goes on and on and at a certain point in the piece, it basically plays itself out in the reverse direction, coming full circle.

VARIATION SEVEN: "THE SMALLEST THING"

This movement is about learning to appreciate the little things — small victories, the smallest of steps. This movement encapsulates that feeling of appreciating the moment by featuring the trumpet in some spots all by itself, letting you sit in the playing for a bit to appreciate it.

VARIATION EIGHT: "A DAY IS FOREVER - LIKE ANY OTHER"

This movement is about feeling as if you've experienced an entire lifetime in one day, an entire range of emotions. We can sometimes wake up one day and feel like everybody's happy and things are going so well. And there's a moment in the day where you feel like you've hit your lowest low. And so, this variation is about accepting the ups and downs with an autistic child as a part of life.

VARIATION NINE: "THREE ROADS DIVERGED"

This is a play on the famous line, "Two roads diverged in a yellow wood" from the Robert Frost poem. That poem is about you taking the road less traveled. This movement suggests a third road that's not even visible until you find yourself on it. There's a well-known story in the autism community about how being a parent is planning to take a trip to Rome but you get off the plane and find out you've arrived in Holland. So, it's the idea that you think you're going one place, and you find out you're in an entirely different place that you never really knew existed, and what it's like to take that road.



PROGRAM NOTES

VARIATION TEN: "LEARNING SIMPLY TO BE"

The tenth movement is all about being in the moment and adapting. It's about learning how to be with somebody as a parent, learning how to interact with Loren, and appreciating that moment for what it is without any expectations beyond the moment in front of you. It's a lifelong journey you continue to work on every single day.

VARIATION ELEVEN: IT'S ENOUGH TO BE HERE. NOW

This final variation is about acceptance. It's about Justin understanding his son for who he is, learning to know himself for who he is as Loren's father, and to know that that they are on a journey together. Wherever they are, it will be enough because they're together.

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ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES

JUSTIN MORELL, COMPOSER



Justin Morell is a composer, guitarist and music educator whose work crosses genres between classical and jazz styles. He is an associate professor of music composition and theory at Lebanon Valley College in Pennsylvania. Justin's multimedia work includes notable contributions to Steven Spielberg's Catch Me if You Can, Lifetime Original Movies, TV sitcom The Naked Truth, and The Lion King — San Francisco production.

"What began as a mission to celebrate neurodiversity became an opportunity for me to connect with my son and hear his voice in a way I had not before," said Morell. "The music is born of intense emotion-sometimes painful and sometimes joyfuland of hope for a compassionate future where all people are loved and respected for their humanity."

JOHN DAVERSA, TRUMPET



John Daversa is a multi-Grammy Award winning, Emmy-nominated trumpet player, composer, arranger, producer, bandleader and educator. He is world renowned for his dynamic and emotive style of trumpet and EVI playing, along with imaginative, genrebending compositions and arrangements. Daversa is Chair of Studio Music and Jazz at Frost School of Music, University of Miami, and an active educator. John Daversa is a Schilke Music Artist and a Burglund Artist.




DIRECTOR'S NOTE

DIRECTOR MILCHO SHARES HER ARTISTIC VISION OF THE ALL WITHOUT WORDS LIVE PRESENTATION:

"We Don't Know" has been the recurrent answer to the why's and what's about Loren's behaviors and possible thoughts. As an outsider, bystander, and observer, I can only speculate and translate based on my artistic perception...knowing I may very well be completely wrong. Having been touched profoundly during the time spent with Loren and his loving family, I've been allowing myself with all due respect to Loren's story, to take the risk with my creative proposal from a place of "I also don't know" but I can limitlessly WONDER!

After witnessing elements which seem to captivate and stimulate this young man's mind, he unintentionally has given me a road to follow as a visual artist. The hours of spinning wrapped inside his sensory swing protecting him like a cocoon is representative of what we will see activated over the musicians, and the dancers floating through the stage like garden fairies in nature are a reminder of those things that are there but only a few can see or hear. Creating a safe space where we get lost in time and beauty while we are all moved together is the experience that we are creating with All Without Words Live for our audience so that we can all walk away with our hearts a little warmer.



THE STORY BEHIND ALL WITHOUT WORDS



Inspired by the struggles, triumphs, and humanity of his non-verbal autistic son, Justin Morell — a guitarist, composer, and music professor — interprets the recordings of his son's spontaneous vocalizations to create a stunning array of compositions. Through his collaboration with multi-Grammy winning trumpeter, John Daversa, the orchestral jazz trumpet concerto All Without Words was born. This important project sparked the partnership between Boundless Arts Foundation and the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra (CSO) to create this special live filmed experience.

THE STORY

To understand how the *All Without Words Live* event came to be, we have to start at the beginning.

Justin Morell comes from a great lineage of musicians, was surrounded by artistic and musical peers, and excelled in the craft himself. And as many expecting parents do, Justin envisioned the day his son would follow in the musical legacy of their family.

At the age of three, Morell's son, Loren, was diagnosed with non-verbal autism, having only the capability to communicate through spontaneous vocalizations and assistive devices. Very early on, Morell and his wife, Jennifer Taggart, were left to foresee a world in which Loren could not use language to show his peers the light he had to offer. They worried that society would not value their son's humanity. In the midst of heartbreak, Justin thought, surely there was a way to share Loren's spirit.

One night, Justin was with Loren as he was using his therapy swing in their home. As Justin listened to the sounds and vocalizations coming from Loren, he thought to himself, "That sounds a lot like singing." Grabbing his phone, Justin began recording. Upon replaying them, he was able to hear his son's voice in a way he had never heard before — it sounded like snippets of a melody. After hours of stretching and slowing down these sounds, he began to fit these variations of Loren's voice into the sketches of a beautiful, larger creation. These became the cornerstones for Justin to write a profoundly intimate symphonic work that reflected his relationship with his son and his experience as a father.



THE LIVE EVENT

As Justin began to work on his compositions, he shared his sketches and intent with his childhood friend John Daversa, a conductor, producer, composer, music professor, and jazz trumpet virtuoso who joined as a soloist on the project. As the pair recognized the strength and power of the music, they pooled their friends and resources to create a full-length album titled, *ALL WITHOUT WORDS: Variations Inspired by Loren.* The overwhelming support they received from recruited musicians was astounding to Morell. Every artist was profoundly motivated by their strong ties to the autism community. The Boundless Arts Foundation provided resources to enable and share the completed album and recorded the story in a documentary format.

During post-production of the *All Without Words* documentary, the Boundless Arts Foundation realized they had such a special story it could further evolve into a live experience, expanding an immersion into Loren's world.

A long-time Cincinnati resident and friend of John Daversa, Kent Savage, President of The Boundless Arts Foundation, proposed transforming the story of the documentary into a live event. Boundless Arts Foundation was able to secure a partnership with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra (CSO) who were impressed by the depth of the music and its story. They eagerly welcomed the partnership to catapult the sharing of this project into the event size that it deserved.

All Without Words Live accentuates Loren Morell's story using theatrical, dance, light, and an artistic interpretation that will inspire the world to embrace the humanity of neurodiversity. Thank you for celebrating Loren and the entire autistic community through this special one-time event that will be captured and preserved for generations.
